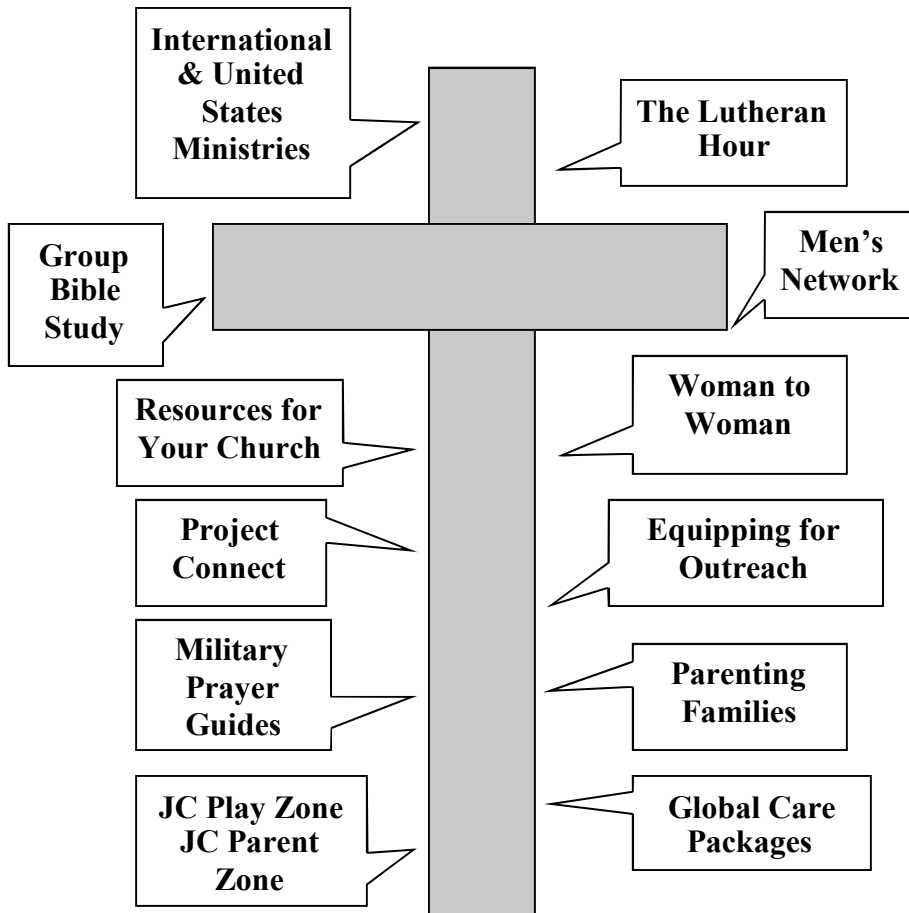

President's Message

Greetings from the Kansas District LLL!

The question I frequently hear is “what can the LLL or Lutheran Hour Ministries (LHM) do for our church?” With declining LCMS membership and also declining LHM sponsors, an attempt to answer this question is the prime focus of LHM at present. Emphasis is targeted on three key areas:

Men Statistics tell us that 85% of guys consider themselves Christians. Yet, less than 35% attend church on a regular basis. We continue to work towards an LHM ambassador in every congregation. Kansas presently has 91 in our 165 congregations. We are attempting to increase the number of active men's groups in congregations and started a “Men's Network,” found on the web at www.lhmmen.com. About 2000 congregations have signed in to date. There is a lot of ideas and information to help a men's group grow and stay active. And, it is free!

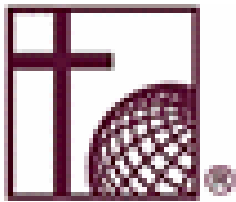
Women The radio program Woman to Woman is again available on over 240 radio stations featuring Phyllis Wallace. In the Manhattan area it is aired on 95.3 FM at 7:30 AM Saturdays; 1350 AM at 11:00 AM Sundays; and on XM radio, 170, Saturdays at 12:30 PM. Other stations can be found on www.lhm.org. World Missions Thirty-seven offices around the world broadcast the Lutheran Hour each week. Also, about 280,000 are enrolled in Bible correspondence courses, puppet shows, and many congregations are active. The opportunity to share Christ is HUGE. About 4 billion people live near these 37 locations and only 1 billion know Christ. Bringing Christ to the Nations and Nations to the Church is our central theme. On average in one week about 1,191,726 contacts are made. This equates to over 61.9 million contacts annually. Many other programs are available. 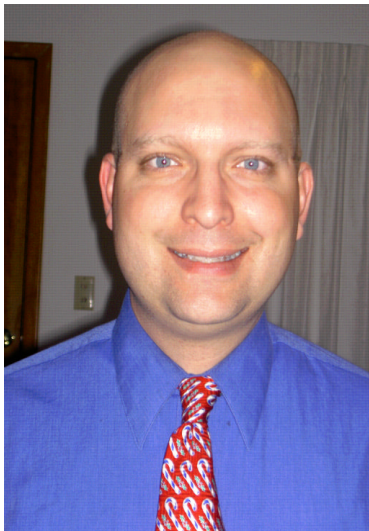

Pastoral Advisor’s Column Rev Seth Meyer Canton

Have any of you have worn sackcloth recently? Perhaps you sat in an ash pile (not including an attempt to win some money out of the home video folks). While it is highly unlikely that any of us have experienced either of these events, this is exactly what the people of Nineveh did when they heard that their days on earth were numbered.

If you were told that you had only 40 days to live what would you do? How about one day? You might you wear some comfortable clothes after a dip in the hot tub, but wearing sackcloth (definitely not the new cashmere) and hanging out at the local dump, does not sound like a little slice of heaven.

The people of Nineveh clearly were not interested in a day at the spa before their end came. In fact they were not looking forward to 40 days of pampering. Rather, their concern was not the days that they had, instead their whole community was focused on the days that they did not have.

What is even more amazing is that God was concerned with the lives of these disobedient people beyond their limited days. We are told that “When God saw what they did...he had compassion...” (Jonah 3:10). God added to their lives, fantastic! God more than doubled their days. However, God’s compassion went beyond these few fashion focused fellows earthly lives. In fact, God’s compassion went well beyond Nineveh to the whole world.

Jonah actually laments at God’s compassion grumbling “I knew that you are a gracious and compassionate God, slow to anger and abounding in love, a God who relents from sending calamity” (Jonah 4:2). However, Paul celebrates God’s total plan of compassion joyfully stating “Praise be to the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of compassion and the God of all comfort, who comforts us in all our troubles, so that we can comfort those in any trouble with the comfort we ourselves have received from God. For just as the sufferings of Christ flow over into our lives, so also through Christ our comfort overflows.” (2 Corinthians 1:3-5)

I hope none of you take up wearing sackcloth and start hanging out in ash piles. Instead recognize that however great our sins might be, we can be certain that we have a God of even greater compassion who did not spare His own Son but gave Him up to give us life. Through faith in Jesus we are blessed with compassion in our few days here on earth and even more fully in heaven.
