92nd International Convention is History & Historical



This year's convention in Greensboro, N.C. was inspirational and "battery charging". The most important business conducted was deciding to go to a biennial convention, which passed by an 82% positive vote. Next year's convention will be in Omaha as planned, with by-law changes to allow for District or Region meetings in the odd number years. Bruce Wurdeman was introduced as the new executive director of LHM, beginning August 1, by retiring executive director Larry Lumpe. One thought that was evident throughout the convention was affirming that all the "Glory goes to God", each speaker and presenter made that point.

The opening worship service on Thursday followed the convention theme "Share His Story" the preacher was Southeast District LC-MS President Jon Diefenthaler. His message was excellent and the music was great. It's always impressive for a country boy from a small congregation to be part of a worship service with 700 plus in attendance, even though the Gospel message is timeless and unrelated to the number hearing it.

International representatives from Chile (Marianela Bravo), Cameroon (Rev. Sam Frouisou), India (Rev. David Chinnayan), Russia (Ingor Savich), and Asia (Gunya Nathalang) were introduced and gave a short message about LHM ministry in their country or region. Chile is the newest International ministry beginning in 2007.

God is always opening doors for LHM to present the Gospel, many times in unexpected ways. When By Kids for Kids care packages were sent to Vietnam the government overseeing the distribution put it on national TV and the LHM representative gave a Gospel message to this largely non-Christian nation. The government also said they would allow and be happy if LHM would open an international school in their country.

The U.S. Ministries presentation used a cute and amusing part video and part live format. The report numbers are impressive and should be shared with many potential donors. We get a tremendous "bang for our buck" in the LHM ministry programs.

President's Message LUTHERAN LAYMEN'S LEAGUE

Our registered legal name is Lutheran Laymen's League (LLL). However, we refer to what we do as Lutheran Hour Ministries (LHM). Kansas, Nebraska, and Missouri represent 14.8% of the U.S. donors and these three states have 98 men's groups in congregations registered, or 28% of the U.S. total.

The radio stations reach about 669,000 people each week with the Lutheran Hour. The radio program called "Woman to Woman" reaches about 281,000 people each week. With requests for daily devotions (156,400/week) and I-pod and podcast downloads and MP3 downloads and websites, newsletters and internet connections in one week 1,191,726 people connected with LHM. At that average, 61,929,752 people are reached in a year through LHM. That doesn't include about 280,000 people enrolled in Bible correspondence courses or the potential 800,000 listeners to the Armed Forces Network including military prayer guides, etc.

What does LLL do? It "Brings Christ to the Nations and the Nations to the Church."

Many in Kansas are involved. There are many meetings at the church, zone, district, or international level to get updated. We welcome you to post our logo "Share the Story," the story of Jesus Christ, on your refrigerator or office or desk. The Reporter includes great articles of events and people to contact. Please get involved. The harvest is ready and it's a joy-filled story for all to hear.

“By Christ Alone” PA Rev Seth Meyer

“Amos answered and said to Amaziah, "I was no prophet, nor a prophet's son, but I was a herdsman and a dresser of sycamore figs. But the LORD took me from following the flock, and the LORD said to me, 'Go, prophesy to my people Israel.'" – Amos 7:14-15

Recently in the readings we have come across this reading from the Old Testament book of Amos. Amos is responding to Amaziah’s charges that Amos is some illegitimate, southern money grubbing, prophet for hire. Amos responds by telling Amaziah, this is not his chosen profession. He does not make money doing this. He is now at Bethel because, “the LORD took me from following the flock, and the LORD said to me, 'Go, prophesy to my people Israel.'”

Maybe you are not from around here. Such is my case. Yes I have now lived in Kansas for four years. However, this is not where I was born and raised. It is a state and a people I am only beginning understand. Yet, like Amos, I was sent by Christ, with my family, to prophesy to his people.

Unlike Amos, I am a pastor’s son. In fact one of my brothers is a pastor and another is currently enrolled at Concordia Seminary St. Louis, MO. We are professional church workers. Yet, as with most of you, Amos is not a child of a church worker nor did he seek to be a professional church worker.

Still Christ has sent each of you into places that are not friendly to the word. The work place may frown upon your overtly Christian symbols, dress and speech. There will be those who will walk briskly past the LLL booth at the state fair. Others will wonder why you cannot skip worship to go to the game.

Should we leave people alone? Must we separate time with God and time at work? Amos was not silent concerning the matters of his day. He spoke against false worship of God and self indulgence at the expense of the elderly, the widows and the children. For this, he was hated by many. Christ’s words in Matthew bring us hope of more than earthly pleasure. “**Blessed** are you when others revile you and persecute you and utter all kinds of evil against you falsely on my account. Rejoice and be glad, for your reward is great in heaven, for so they persecuted the prophets who were before you (Matthew 5:11-12).”

The Lutheran Laymen’s League is called to be Amos to their generation. The situation is similar to Amos’ day. Sinful greed is ruining relationships. My happiness takes the place of others needs. Society tells us to be quiet and make a buck somewhere else, but not in my back yard.

Also similar is the need for salvation through the Messiah. Amos’ message was meant to turn hearts back to God alone for forgiveness and salvation. Today, we know the Messiah’s name. Through Jesus alone does God offer and give forgiveness, life and salvation. Through him alone are broken relationships healed. By his sweet name do we prophesy, “salvation in **no** one else, for there is **no other name** under heaven given among men by which we must be saved (Acts 4:12).” By Christ Alone

Prayer Guides Hit the Road with Troops Heading Overseas

The process of military deployment is no small thing for soldiers and for the families and friends they leave behind. Recently, Rich Cohrs, manager for district and congregational relations for Lutheran

Hour Ministries' U.S. Ministries Division, had the chance to help ease that critical separation between soldiers and their loved ones. He hand-delivered 1,000 LHM prayer guides to Gary C. Williams, 35th Signal Brigade Chaplain with the U.S. Army at Fort Gordon, Georgia.

The prayer guide *Those Who Serve*, penned by Pastor Ken Klaus, offers words of reflection and encouragement on service, country, military life, comrades, battle, holidays and significant family anniversary days, along with a series of texts to use throughout the week.

"These booklets will be given to the soldiers and family members of the 35th Signal Brigade," Williams said. "The prayer guides will be given particularly to the 67th Signal Battalion (about 500 soldiers) and the 35th Signal Brigade HQs unit (about 100 soldiers), both located here at Fort Gordon."

we put on a chaplain resource table the day the soldiers depart the U.S. The prayer guides are offered to soldiers, their spouses, and some of their children," Williams said. "Deployment day is emotional and sometimes hard to gauge for soldiers. Those who have never deployed experience fears and thoughts they have never had to deal with and hence the prayer guides offer a message of hope in Christ our Savior. Many soldiers are unchurched and these kinds of resources might very likely be the first time they have encountered the Good News of forgiveness in Christ," he added

For Cohrs, there was an immediate sense the prayer guides would be put to good use. "I felt honored to be able to provide this resource. The soldiers who looked over the booklet were encouraged and thankful to receive this guide. I know they will be a blessing to those men and women who are deployed," he said.

Orphan Grain Train - Humanitarian Aid

Since 1992 Orphan Grain Train has shipped over 63 million pounds of goods around the world. To read about OGT activities on the web, go to: www.ogt.org. If you do not have a computer, contact a committee member, listed on this page, for details about current OGT projects.

Adopt an Orphanage, 55 are currently being sponsored, at \$280.00 per month, in Russia, Kyrgyzstan, Estonia, Latvia and Lithuania with hundreds more needing sponsorship.

Buy a Shunt Save a Life—over 1,486 lives have been saved in Russia, Nicaragua and Panama. A \$140.00 shunt helps remove fluid from the brain literally saving their life.

Clothes and medical supplies—Several truck loads of items have been shipped, from Kansas to Norfolk this calendar year. Some groups collect new socks and underwear. Shipping by semi truck is costing around \$1.00 per mile with per box cost of \$9.00 or more depending on the destination.

Personal Survivor and School Kits—OGT provides a list of personal items to pack in a large zip lock bag. A backpack is used for school items.

Project Scrub Bucket—A \$36.00 donation provides a broom and mop along with 8 cleaning item put together by OGT for shipment.

Warm Boots for Russia—A \$15.00 donation provides a child with a pair of boots and a Holy Bible in Russian.
